#### **CHAIR'S STATEMENT**

## Hon. Dr Craig Emerson



Once again, the McKell Institute spent much of 2021 online as many of us returned to life in lockdown. Having adjusted to work from home and the delivery of virtual events in 2020, we were able to maintain our positioning at the forefront of state and federal policy debates. For a decade now, McKell has been committed to big ideas – and in light of the COVID crisis, big ideas have never been more important.

This year, Premier Dominic Perrottet and the NSW government have ramped up their support of our proposal to replace stamp duty with land tax - our first ever policy recommendation put forward 10 years ago in our report *Homes For All*.

McKell also had a landmark win in November of this year. After exposing rampant wage theft in NSW's blueberry industry in our 2020 report, *Blue Harvest*, the Fair Work Commission announced that farm workers in the agriculture industry will now receive a guaranteed minimum wage. This announcement came after the AWU's year-long case to ensure that these workers have a safety net and get the fair day's pay they deserve.

We've released more than 20 reports this year and hosted more than 40 events. Speakers at McKell functions included Reserve Bank Governor Phillip Lowe, Shadow Treasurer Dr Jim Chalmers MP, former Obama Adviser Betsey Stevenson, NSW Opposition Leader Chris Minns MP, Queensland Treasurer the Hon Cameron Dick MP and NSW Secretary of Health Elizabeth Koff.

In May we hosted the annual pre-Budget address with the Leader of the Opposition the Hon Anthony Albanese MP. The Labor Leader outlined his priorities for Australia's economic future ahead of the Federal Government's Budget.

McKell also published a report, *Power to the People*, analysing the economics of community batteries to store surplus solar power. Our recommendations were adopted as Federal Labor policy.

A big welcome to the newest members of the McKell Institute's Research Committee, which now comprises Professor David Peetz, Dr Angela Jackson, Professor Richard Holden, Professor Emeritus Joellen Riley, Dr Tim Williams and Professor John Hewson AM. This team brings extra depth and rigour to McKell's fantastic research program.

We have a big year ahead of us in 2022, with a federal election on the way. Under the leadership of CEO Michael Buckland, the McKell Institute will continue to advance its progressive policy agenda and influence reform across the country.

#### **CEO STATEMENT**

## Michael Buckland

2021 marks ten years since the McKell Institute was founded and the impact of our team and supporters has never been clearer.

The Australian Workers Union won their landmark case to set a minimum wage for fruit pickers following our report that found workers in the industry were paid as little as \$3 an hour.

When Labor Leader Anthony Albanese outlined his overhaul of the Childcare Subsidy, he was addressing the McKell Institute for the launch of our report – "Why reform of the Child Care Subsidy would strengthen Australia's economy."

When NSW Premier Dominic Perrottet was challenged in parliament to outline the benefits of his transition from stamp duty to land tax, he cited the McKell Institute submission to his tax review.

The NSW Government extended the toll relief program to small businesses as one recommendation from our package of proposals to support shift workers and tradies.

And just weeks after the McKell Institute outlined how pharmacies can accelerate the vaccination roll-out, the Prime Minister increased the number of pharmacies delivering COVID-19 vaccines from 65 to over 2,000.

Our reports this year covering community batteries, land tax, childcare, the COVID-19 vaccine roll-out, gender equality and representation, support for shift workers and tradies, infrastructure, wage theft, wage growth and the digital divide all led to action taken by leaders.

Our impact on policy debates was a result of our hardworking and growing research team. Their passion, insight, and ability to translate complex policy into workable solutions are what makes the McKell Institute unique.

2021 was a challenging year for most Australians. Young people and women were impacted severely by economic lockdowns while support for some sectors remained stubbornly inadequate.

It was heartbreaking to see so many people shut down in inadequate housing, compounded by social isolation. When governments make the big decisions that affect



our lives, they have a responsibility to support the people most affected.

While our national attention was rightly focused on the immediate needs of workers and industry, we cannot ignore the pressing issues that will continue long after the pandemic abates.

Insecure work, housing affordability, gender inequality, wage theft and wage growth are just some of the issues that have been left unaddressed.

The McKell Institute is proud of championing big reform. We will take on these issues in 2022 as we strive for a more equal society.

Good policy begins with dialogue. Despite the disruption throughout 2021, we continued to host state and Commonwealth Ministers and Shadow Ministers. Bringing people together to discuss big ideas felt more important during those days stuck at home.

Thank you to our Chair, Craig Emerson, and all our Directors whose guidance and support has been invaluable.

And a special thanks to our members and sponsors who sustain the McKell Institute. Your engagement and insight allow us to continue to make the changes Australia needs.



#### EXECUTIVE CHAIR, THE MCKELL INSTITUTE QUEENSLAND STATEMENT

2021 was an extraordinary year for Queensland. The state closed its borders and took an aggressive approach to the suppression of Covid-19. The result has been that Queensland has avoided the harshest impacts of the pandemic which locked down New South Wales and Victoria for months and which ravaged public health in the Asia Pacific and the world.

And yet from this position of isolation, our state's political leaders - Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk, Brisbane Mayor Adrian Schrinner and the federal Minister for Sport ventured to Tokyo where Brisbane and South East Queensland were named host for the 2032 Olympics, the most global and interconnected event in the world.

This juxtaposition of the domestic and the international; the inward and outward looking has always been at the heart of Queensland's civic debate and the theme ran through the research and events program the McKell Institute Queensland delivered in 2021.

In the year passed, McKell Queensland has expanded its membership to include corporations from a broader range of key economic sectors. We now bring together business and union leaders from tech, law, resources, energy, banking and finance, property, education, retail and health. We have provided those members with access to a diverse range of speakers including Opposition Leader David Crisafulli, Deputy Premier Steven Miles, Shadow Federal Treasuer Jim Chalmers, new Under Treasurer (Treasury Secretary) Leon Allen, Environment Minister Meaghan Scanlon and the perennially colourful voice from the North, the longstanding Federal Member for Kennedy, Bob Katter.

Our boardroom discussions have offered members insight into a range of critical and influential views and informed the policy research the Institute has undertaken.

In addition to influential national policy work on the importance of infrastructure, the policy architecture suppressing wages in Australia, the importance of universal childcare and the costs of the delayed vaccine rollout, McKell Queensland has developed research projects including – *Bridging Queensland's Digital Divide; Active transport* (not coal fired cars), and *How only more women can fix Parliament's "culture" problem* 

As Executive Director, I have developed a new podcast, Deep North, which seeks to get to the critical thinkers and issues in Queensland's civic debate and I provide regular media commentary, arguing the case for good policy, particularly through a weekly spot on the ABC.

In November this year, I stepped down as Executive Director of McKell Queensland but I retain involvement in the Institute by joining existing Chair Eleanor Dickens as co-Chair. I believe very firmly in the need for a strong, expert, independent voice for good policy. The McKell Institute provides that and I believe that its growth will continue under our next Executive Director.

I thank the Board for its support in 2021 and extend best wishes to departing director Dr Linda Colley, who is taking up an important public sector role. I thank the corporate, union and NFP members for their contribution and engagement and our many supporters for backing our work and being part of a movement that consistently says good policy matters.

No one likes to admit they were wrong, but last year I wrote 2020 was a year like no other, and it turned out that 2021 was a convincing rerun of our pandemic *annus horribilis*.

Public policy is about learning, analysing, and coming up with new and better solutions for the policy challenges we confront. The job of policy reform is never complete because circumstances change, and we are required to think and rethink about the issues that confront us. Our role here at the McKell Institute is to be active participants in thinking about how we can improve the way we live, work, and interact as a community. These two years have given us more time stuck at home than ever before to be contemplating these guestions.

While 2021 has felt like an endless rerun of 2020, the opportunity it provides us as policy professionals is to change the reasons why we got stuck here in the first place and to address these problems at their core. Repeating the same mistakes is not a sign of determination or conviction, but a stubborn intransigence.

To my mind, the central lesson from the pandemic is that a well-functioning government that takes active and purposeful steps to deliver what the nation (or state) needs is fundamental to a prosperous community. A purposeful government that makes sure our health services are well resourced, that we have a domestic industrial capability to provide us the goods we need, access to local amenity with healthy and green communities, and a place to call home with a secure roof over our heads. The Commonwealth's COVID-19 vaccine rollout was the exact opposite of this, and the shambles and delay had serious consequences. A lesson we need to learn from.

On a relative scale, the COVID disruptions to our activities here at the McKell Institute were insignificant compared to what has happened to others during the pandemic. But nevertheless, as Melbourne became the most locked down city in the world, 2021 once again saw our program of events interrupted. After a good start to the year with a series of Executive Luncheons including with Commonwealth Minister for Superannuation, Senator the Hon Jane Hume, and Chair of the Productivity Commission Michael Brennan, and a pre-budget breakfast with the Victorian Treasurer Tim Pallas MP, restrictions in the second half of the year prevented further in-person events.

Our research agenda has remained strong and active, with new research published examining insecure work, portable entitlements, housing, infrastructure, aviation support, early childhood education, and much more. The diversity of our research portfolio definitely keeps us busy and engaged. Of significance has been a landmark report with Lifeline Australia on how Victorians responded to the pandemic, their mental health, and when they called for helped.

At an organisational level, it has been a pleasure working with Michael as he commenced as McKell's national CEO in January. Michael brings enthusiasm, policy curiosity, and solid values to the task of running a think tank. It was also a pleasure working with outgoing Queensland Executive Director Rachel Nolan, along with the rest of the McKell staff.

My particular thanks to Kelvyn Lavelle, Chair of McKell's Victorian Advisory Board, and Victorian advisory board members Liberty, Luke, Mary, Chris and Susie. You have all provided invaluable counsel, ideas, advice and much needed reality checks during our second year of extended lockdowns.

Here's to a very different 2022.

## **Reports & Research**

As COVID-19 continued to impact Australia throughout 2021, keeping Australians safe remained the primary focus of policymakers. But important debates also emerged regarding Australia's post-COVID recovery.

In 2021, the McKell Institute released fifteen major reports examining issues as diverse as portable entitlements and wage growth, housing affordability and superannuation, the troubled vaccine rollout, reforms to redundancy and improving our health system – each advancing new ideas aimed at ensuring our recovery from COVID-19 leads to a fairer, more prosperous Australia.
